**Part B: Bachelor's degree programme in English Language and Culture
for academic year 2018-2019**

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SECTION 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Article 1.1 – Applicability

These Teaching and Examination Regulations comprise a Part A and a Part B. This degree programme-specific Part B supplements Part A, which contains general stipulations for the teaching and examinations of the Bachelor's degree programmes taught at the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains stipulations that specifically concern the Bachelor's degree programme in **English Language and Culture**.

SECTION 2 QUALIFICATIONS

Article 2.1 – Admission to the programme *with profile requirement*

Without prejudice to the provisions of Article 2.1. of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations, the following supplementary requirements apply to this degree programme: N/A.

Article 2.2 – Admission to the degree programme with an HBO propaedeutic certificate

1. Without prejudice to the provisions of Article 2.3. of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations, the following supplementary language requirements apply to this degree programme: English at VWO final examination level. The English language proficiency requirement can be met by presenting one of the following:
 - a. a subject certificate for VWO English (mark 6 or higher)
 - b. the iBT TOEFL test: minimum score of 90, with a minimum score of 21 on all components
 - c. IELTS Academic Module 6.5, with a minimum score of 6.0 on all components
 - d. a certificate from the University of Groningen Language Centre, at least B2 CEFR.
2. Students who have the propaedeutic exam of the Dutch HBO Lerarenopleiding Engels are exempted from taking a language test for admission to the programme.

Article 2.3 – Educational deficiencies

1. Deficiencies in educational qualifications in the subjects listed below may be compensated for by passing the relevant examinations at the level of the VWO final examination to the satisfaction of the Admissions Board: N/A.
2. Under certain circumstances, the Admissions Board can request a university lecturer in the relevant subject to arrange one or more tests.

Article 2.4 – Language requirement for foreign certificates

1. Students who have been admitted to a degree programme on the basis of a foreign certificate or degree may be required by the Admissions Board – before registration – to pass an English language test, to be administered by an agency stipulated by the Admissions Board.
2. The English language proficiency requirement can be met by presenting one of the following:
 - a. a subject certificate for VWO English (mark 6 or higher)
 - b. the iBT TOEFL test: minimum score of 90, with a minimum score of 21 on all components
 - c. IELTS Academic Module 6.5, with a minimum score of 6.0 on all components
 - d. a certificate from the University of Groningen Language Centre, at least B2 CEFR.

Article 2.5 – Starting date

Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 2.7 of Part A, the following additional requirement applies to this degree programme:

Students who have previously been enrolled in this degree programme or who wish to start in a higher year may apply to the Admissions Board for permission to start on a date other than 1 September. The Admissions Board will grant permission for an alternative starting date if the specific course units that

the student in question wishes to follow start on this date and if the student has satisfied the entry requirement for these course units.

In year 3 first semester students do a minor. In very specific cases, the Minor Abroad can be extended with a second semester (e.g. Harting exchange). In those cases, students must do in principle 60 ECTS abroad, selected in this way: 30 ECTS as Minor Abroad, 20 ECTS in English Language and Culture subjects, replacing the choice of courses normally taken in semester 2 at UG, and a BA dissertation of 10 ECTS. The dissertation may be written under local supervision at the host university, or under long-distance supervision from Groningen. Harting students may also do a 10-ECTS internship as part of their Minor Abroad, teaching Dutch at the host university.

In year 3 second semester, students should choose two modules in each block, in addition to the compulsory BA dissertation. One of these modules must be from the third year as outlined in the table above; the other one could also be a second-year module.

Ten ECTS of the elective modules in years 2 and 3 can be traded in for modules outside the department (25 ECTS in the case of an Open Degree Programme) but EAP: Research Reports and the BA Thesis are compulsory in any case.

2. Transitional arrangements for students who started before 2016

If you started before 2016, your combination of courses should result in a total of 180 ECTS: a Major of 120 ECTS (50 ECTS first year; 30 ECTS second year, and 40 ECTS third year, including 30 ECTS English proficiency), a Minor of 30 ECTS, and 30 ECTS electives (*vrije ruimte*, spread over no more than 3 disciplines, at most 20 ECTS first-year courses (P codes), which may also be filled with English courses –if the capacity and group size allows you to take an extra course). Since old style Minors are no longer offered, you must contact the study advisor about alternatives. The old style second year courses can be freely complemented by new second year courses. The old-style third-year courses that were offered for the last time in 2017-18 may be completed by courses from the new second or third year.

In individual cases it may be preferable to transfer to the new programme. This needs to be discussed with the study advisor and approved by the Exam Board.

Article 5.2 Open degree programme (Vrij programma)

As a regular possibility in the BA in English Language and Culture, students are allowed to trade in 10 ECTS of their modules in the second semester of the second and third years apart from EAP: Research reports and the BA Thesis.

Students can also opt for an Open Degree programme, as stipulated in Article 3.11 of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations. In that case, the Major can be reduced by a maximum of 15 ECTS more (so a maximum of 25 ECTS in total) of the modules in the second semester of the second and third years, apart from EAP: Research reports and the BA Thesis. Students should submit a request with an alternative plan to the Exam Board, paying attention to the entrance requirements for the BA Thesis.

SECTION 7 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 7.1 – Amendments

2. Any amendments to Part B of these Regulations will, following the recommendation by and/or upon the approval of the Programma Committee and the Faculty Council, be confirmed by the Faculty Board in a separate decree.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.

Article 7.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board will duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 8.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via the Student Portal.

Article 7.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations shall take effect on 1 September 2018.

These Regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 21 August 2018 and approved by the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee where required.
