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SECTION 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Article 1.1 – Applicability

These Teaching and Examination Regulations comprise a Part A and a Part B. This degree programme-specific Part B supplements Part A, which contains general stipulations for the teaching and examinations of the Bachelor's degree programmes taught at the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains stipulations that specifically concern the Bachelor's degree programme in **English Language and Culture**.

SECTION 2 QUALIFICATIONS

Article 2.1 – Admission to the programme *with profile requirement*

Without prejudice to the provisions of Article 2.1. of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations, the following supplementary requirements apply to this degree programme: N/A.

Article 2.2 – Educational deficiencies

1. Deficiencies in educational qualifications in the subjects listed below may be compensated for by passing the relevant examinations at the level of the VWO final examination to the satisfaction of the Admissions Board: N/A.
2. Under certain circumstances, the Admissions Board can request a university lecturer in the relevant subject to arrange one or more tests.

Article 2.3 – Starting date

Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 2.7 of Part A, the following additional requirement applies to this degree programme:

Students who have previously been enrolled in this degree programme or who wish to start in a higher year may apply to the Admissions Board for permission to start on a date other than 1 September. The Admissions Board will grant permission for an alternative starting date if the specific course units that the student in question wishes to follow start on this date and if the student has satisfied the entry requirement for these course units.

In year 3 first semester students do a minor. In very specific cases, the Minor Abroad can be extended with a second semester (e.g. Harting exchange). In those cases, students must do in principle 60 ECTS abroad, selected in this way: 30 ECTS as Minor Abroad, 20 ECTS in English Language and Culture subjects, replacing the choice of courses normally taken in semester 2 at RUG, and a BA dissertation of 10 ECTS. The dissertation may be written under local supervision at the host university, or under long-distance supervision from Groningen. Harting students may also do a 10-ECTS internship as part of their Minor Abroad, teaching Dutch at the host university.

The courses listed as A and B are open to Exchange students and pre-master students, and, after prior permission from the Board of Examiners, to regular BA students of English Language and Culture to replace an elective module from second or third year in second semester.

In year 3 second semester, students should choose two modules in each block, in addition to the compulsory BA dissertation. At least two modules must be from the third year as outlined in the table above, including *Crossing Borders* (from semester 1a); the other two could also be second-year modules (including *Neo-Victorian Literature* from semester 1b).

Ten ECTS of the second-year elective modules in years 2 and 3 can be traded in for modules outside the department but EAP: Debate and Discussion, two third-year courses, and the BA Thesis are compulsory in any case.

The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus of each individual course unit and the Assessment Plan of the degree programme.

Article 5.2 Open degree programme (Vrij programma)

Students may opt for an Open Degree programme, as stipulated in Article 3.12 of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations. In that case, the Major can be reduced by a maximum of 25 ECTS of the second-year modules in the second semester of the second and third years. EAP: Debate and Discussion, two third-year modules and the BA Thesis are compulsory. Instead of the ECTS dropped for the Open Degree, students must select the equivalent number of ECTS offered at the University of Groningen or elsewhere. First-year modules may be part of that selection. Students should submit a request with an alternative plan to the Board of Examiners, paying attention

to the entrance requirements for the BA Thesis and including a clear future-oriented motivation for their selection of modules.

Students from European Languages and Cultures will only be admitted if they are following the Language & Society Profile Plus. Effectively, this means that admission of ELC students on the basis of this entry requirement can only begin in the academic year 2023-2024.

SECTION 7 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 7.1 – Amendments

1. Any amendments to Part A of these Regulations will, following the recommendation by and/or upon the approval of the Programme Committee and the Faculty Council, be confirmed by the Faculty Board in a separate decree.
2. Any amendments to Part B of these Regulations will, following the recommendation by and/or upon the approval of the Programme Committee and the Faculty Council, be confirmed by the Faculty Board in a separate decree.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.

Article 7.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board will duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 8.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via the Student Portal.

Article 7.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations shall take effect on 1 September 2024.

These Regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 21 August 2024 and approved by the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee where required.
