Box no. I: book excerpts

56 excerpts from books and periodicals, alphabetised by author (P.A. Barentsen – Jo Ypma), dating between approximately 1910-1948

Box no. II: survey ms. D.H.E.A.J. Stork-v.d. Kuyl from Dwingeloo (Drenthe); characteristics of the countryside, interviews West-Friesland, the survey containing 22 questions and 5 rural characteristics (of 5 villages) and 13 interviews

Box no. III: case studies of rural families and agricultural families in the Netherlands: Achterhoek, Betuwe, Drentse zand; **case studies 1-23**, 1 from Achterhoek, 17 from the Betuwe and 5 from Drentse zand

Box no. IV: case studies of rural families and agricultural families in the Netherlands: Drentse zand, Hoogeland, Krimpenerwaard; **case studies 24-42**, 1 from Drentse zand, 7 from the Hoogeland and 11 from the Krimpenerwaard

- 2) Size and make up of family. *Birthdates, names of children, origin*
- 3) Vertical social mobility. *Parents' professions, children's professions*
- 4) Intellectual and vocational training (at school), education of children
- 5) The productive function of the family
- 6) The consumptive function of the family
- 7) Day-to-day life, planning
- 8) Parenting' philosophy
- 9) Sexual education
- 10) Religious formation
- 11) Intellectual and vocation philosophy (within the family);
- 12) Political philosophy
- 13) Aesthetic philosophy (lifestyle)
- 14) Relaxation and leisure
- 15) The family unit as part of society
- 16) Community service
